Why leave a gift in my will?

A legacy gift is one way of expressing gratitude for all that the Church has meant in your life. It can help ensure that St John's continues to be a place of worship, welcome, prayer and service for generations to come.

Do I need to be wealthy to leave a legacy?

No. Gifts of every size make a difference. Many people choose to leave a small percentage of their estate rather than a fixed amount.

Can I leave a gift for a particular purpose?

Yes. You may leave a gift for a particular area of ministry or for the upkeep of St John's building. Because priorities and needs can change over time, we encourage you to discuss any specific intentions with the Rector before finalising your will.

Will a legacy affect my family?

Your family and loved ones should always come first. Many people choose to provide for those closest to them and then leave a proportion of what remains to causes that matter to them.

How do I make a legacy gift?

A legacy gift is made in your will so the first step is to contact a solicitor to draw up a new will or to amend an existing will. Wills are legal documents and as small errors can cause big problems, it is vital to have someone legally qualified to draft or amend your will.

Do I need to tell the church?

No. Your gift can remain entirely private. However, if you choose to tell us, it allows us to thank you and, if you wish, include you among those whose generosity we remember in our prayers.

Thank you

A lasting gift to your church



As a worshipper in St John's, part of the wider Parish of Witney, you are in a tradition of worship in that place for more than 100 years. St John's is not just a hidden jewel of Arts and Crafts architecture in a tranquil churchyard, but still a living church.

As you plan how to distribute your estate and make provision for your loved ones, we pray that you will be inspired to follow Witney Christians down the ages in leaving a final and powerful expression of your thanksgiving to God. A legacy can be a lasting way to support your successors in spreading the good news of Jesus.

A gift in your will for the Parish will help ensure that St John's and the other churches in the group will continue their ministry, meeting the spiritual and pastoral needs of future generations. You may also, or instead, want to leave a gift to help with the upkeep of St John's building itself.

How your gift could help

A) Unrestricted gift (to the PCC)

If you wish to support the ministry and mission of the church, its spiritual and pastoral work is funded across the wider Parish of Witney. You should therefore make your gift to the Parochial Church Council, allowing the Rector and the PCC to decide how the funds might most effectively be used at the time of your gift.

B) Restricted to upkeep and maintenance of the building (to the DCC)

If you want your legacy to help to ensure that the fabric of St John's, its building and fittings, is kept in good repair for future generations, you should make your gift to the officer/s responsible for upkeep

C) Specified purpose

It is of course open to you to make your legacy for a specific purpose which is important to you, but in that case we would ask you first to discuss it with the Rector, before giving detailed instructions to the solicitor preparing your will.

Suggested wording for a standard legacy gift

“ I give___% of my residuary estate OR I give the sum of £_____ pounds only free of all taxes.

Either A)... to the Parochial Church Council of the Parish of Witney, registered charity number 1129784, in the Diocese of Oxford for its general purposes
Or B)... to the officer/s responsible for St John the Baptist Curbridge for the upkeep of its building

And I declare that the receipt of [for A)]an officer of the Parish Church Council/for B) the responsible officer] shall be a sufficient discharge to my executors and trustees”

And I declare that the receipt of an officer of the Parochial Church Council (for A) or District Church Council (for B) shall be sufficient discharge to my executors and trustees.”

Making a gift in your will

Most importantly, please take legal advice to help you decide which of the following types of legacy gift would be right for you

1. A Residuary legacy
2. A Pecuniary legacy
3. A Reversionary legacy
4. A Gift in Kind
5. A Deed of Variation
6. Life Assurance
